



BAY AREA FINANCIAL LEADERS HONOR 2008 CFO OF THE YEAR AWARD WINNERS AND FINALISTS
Event Raises \$400,000 to Help Homeless Youth Get Off San Francisco Streets

San Francisco, Calif.—May 30, 2008—The Selection Panel of the Bay Area CFO of the Year Awards recently announced the 2008 winners in seven award categories. This third-annual event comprises a high-profile assembly of top Bay Area financial talents and honors CFOs who have played a critical role in the success of their companies as well as those who have contributed to the region's economic growth and stability.

On May 29th, more than 450 local leaders attended a gala dinner and awards ceremony at the Palace Hotel in San Francisco to honor Bay Area CFO Award finalists and winners. The festivities included over 20 CFO finalists, winners and past winners. Also in attendance were: Reed Hastings, CEO of Netflix; Leslie Blodgett, CEO of Bare Escentuals; and Andy Grove, former CEO of Intel, who came to honor Lifetime Award winner Andy Bryant, of Intel.

The event raised more than \$400,000 to benefit Larkin Street Youth Services, a globally recognized leader providing innovative and effective outreach, housing, medical, social and educational services to homeless and at-risk youth across 23 programs and 12 sites throughout San Francisco.

"These awards were created first and foremost to honor the CFOs who are often the unsung heroes in their companies, but also to raise critical private philanthropic dollars for kids who are on the street due to no fault of their own," Mary Huss, publisher, *San Francisco Business Times*, and media sponsor of the Bay Area CFO of the Year Awards noted.
